Crowds turn out in January as town celebrates Plough Monday

Plough Monday is the traditional start of the English agricultural year. While local practices may vary, Plough Monday is generally the first Monday after Twelfth Day (Epiphany), 6 January. References to Plough Monday date back to the late 15th century.

The day traditionally saw the resumption of work after the Christmas period in some areas, particularly in northern England and East England. The customs observed on Plough Monday varied by region, but a common feature to a lesser or greater extent was for a plough to be hauled from house to house in a procession, collecting money. They were often accompanied by musicians.

Plough Monday customs declined in the 19th century but were revived in some towns in the 20th. They are now mainly associated with Molly dancing and a good example can be seen each year at Maldon in Essex

Plough Monday, which was revived in Maldon in 1995 - sees a group of molly dancers travel up through Maldon performing their classic style of morris dance.



The story goes that if the plough came around and you were a farmer that didn't donate anything for the parish, you would have your field cross ploughed so that you wouldn't be able to grow anything on it that year.

As a disguise, the villagers would use the soil from the earth to rub on their faces and add to the whole experience.

The type of face colouring depends where you are in the country.

In Maldon, the soil is earthy and black but if you go to Oxfordshire, their face colourings are reddish brown.

Up in the Midlands, they were brave and didn't put on any soil and if you go down to the south east, their faces are white because the soil there is chalky.

Essex Police dog Baloo finds 'forever home'

A police dog who had her leg amputated after being injured on duty has been re-homed by a dog loving couple in our local community, they were chosen by the force, after having received 670 offers to take her.

The Belgian Malinois was retired from duty after being hit by a car. She broke her pelvis and leg, and the leg had to be amputated. Baloo had been responding to an incident with her handler PC Ross Ashcroft in October. PC Ashcroft, who will continue to visit Baloo, said he was delighted his former work partner had found a good home.

Baloo will be taken to Essex Retired Police Dogs Fund events in the future to raise awareness about the charity.

Essex Police Dog Baloo's career was cut short when she was struck by a suspect's car fleeing a crime scene in October. Unfortunately her injuries were so severe her front right leg had to be amputated and she had metal plates screwed into her pelvis. She is undergoing hydrotherapy and physiotherapy as part of a treatment programme at Writtle College. Her rehabilitation will be lifelong.

Money is being raised for Essex Retired Police Dogs Fund and any donation will help Baloo and other retired Police Dogs. Baloo's new carers are planning an outdoor swim 6 miles up the Mawddach estuary at the base of Snowdonia on 28th September 2019 in an event called The Hurly Burly!

If you FIND a dog...

- Look around the area and see if there is anyone obviously looking for their lost pet.
- Report to the local council (dog warden); it is the law and they may already have had the
 dog reported as missing. You can find details of your local dog warden on-line here:
 www.gov.uk/report-stray-dog
- If you can, take the dog to a local vets for them to scan for a chip.
 In most cases they will then be able to call the owner if dog is chipped, or call the local dog warden to collect if not.
- In Scotland you should also report to the police.
- Also check in the 'Lost' section of the DogLost website to see if this dog has been reported as missing. www.doglost.co.uk/dog-search.php?status=Lost
- Many of our volunteers in the area do have scanners so may be able to come out and scan
 the dog for you. You can ask on local DogLost pages if anyone can help or call our head
 office for more information.
- Register the dog on the DogLost website: <u>www.doglost.co.uk</u>
 and share on Social Media such as Facebook / Twitter, local DogLost pages and groups.
- You can also print posters from this dog's page using the View Poster button and put up around the area that he / she was found. Don't forget to laminate in case it rains.
- If you can, put Posters in local shops, pubs, garages, supermarkets; everywhere that there are a lot of people. Spread the word to try to find the owners . . .
